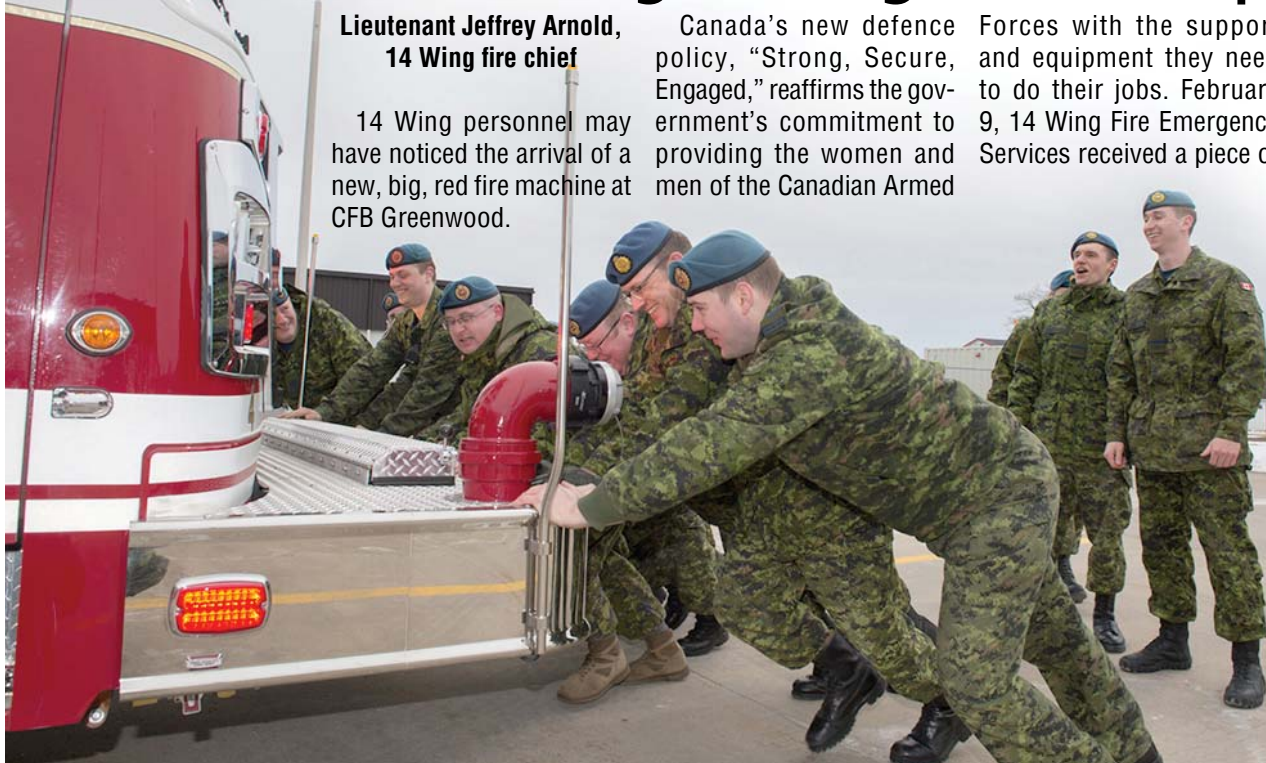

Greenwood team tackles Op Nijmegen 2018

14 Wing Greenwood will provide a team for the 2018 Nijmegen Military March, being held in Nijmegen, Netherlands, July 17 to 20. Teams from across Canada, representing the Navy, Army and Royal Canadian Air Force; will complete the marching event carrying a 10-kilogram ruck (not including food and water) over an average of 40 kilometres per day for four days - totalling approximately 166 kilometres by the end of the event.

Canada's new defence policy, "Strong, Secure, Engaged," reaffirms the government's commitment to providing the women and men of the Canadian Armed Forces with the support and equipment they need to do their jobs. February 9, 14 Wing Fire Emergency Services received a piece of new equipment, enhancing their firefighting and rescue capabilities.

The new fire trucks will replace some vehicles in use since the mid-1990s, now exceeding their life expectancy. Known as the aerial fire fighting vehicle (AFFV), this modern truck provides improved firefighting capabilities, rescue and casualty evacuation to a height of 35 metres (115 feet). It also feature a casualty recovery platform previous vehicles did not have, a pump that can put out 2,000 gallons of water a minute, and almost complete computerization. The vehicle fights fire on modern base and wing infrastructure, such as Greenwood's under construction air traffic control tower, expected to open by end of fiscal year 18/19; and fire in ammunition and fuel containment areas.

The vehicle also provides an enhanced response to aircraft emergencies. "This aerial fire fighting vehicle provides a new capability to better protect passengers and crew during aircraft ground emergencies," says Lieutenant-Colonel Lee Goodman, the Canadian Armed Forces' fire marshal. "With this new vehicle, our firefighters are now better equipped to reach the engine or wing area of our largest aircraft where risk of fire is greatest."

The official unveiling of 14 Wing's AFFV occurred March 21, with 14 Mission Support Squadron Commanding Officer

cer Lieutenant-Colonel Colin Cragg on the fire hall floor to assist in pushing the new vehicle into the fire hall's bay. "It pleases me whenever our 14 Wing firefighters receive state-of-the-art equipment," said 14 Wing Fire Chief Lieutenant Jeffrey Arnold, who shared his excitement with the new truck's arrival. "Our firefighters work tirelessly to serve the 14 Wing community, and their capabilities have now been enhanced."

An \$18.7 million contract for these vehicles was awarded to Aréo-Feu based in Longueuil, Quebec; after an open competition. A total of nine new vehicles are arriving at bases and wings across Canada. The final delivery of these vehicles is expected for April 2018.

"Modernizing the equipment the Canadian Armed Forces rely on to do their jobs is a key priority for the Government of Canada. I am pleased to see that the new aerial fire fighting vehicle is being delivered to bases and wings across the country," says Defence Minister Harjit S. Sajjan.

The National Defence Fire Service is made up of approximately 1,000 military and Department of National Defence firefighters who work out of 18 fire departments at all major Canadian Armed Forces bases across the country. They respond to more than 5,000 calls every year, including fires, aircraft emergencies, medical emergencies, vehicle collisions, hazardous material incidents and technical rescues.

The initial Greenwood team includes all ranks and trades from the wing. Team members agreed to start initial work-up training three times a week during March, including walking anywhere between five to 15 kilometres, three times a week, with a loaded ruck or small pack; and personal strength training to get ready for the first group march at 7:30 a.m. March 26.

Team members must complete a minimum of 500 kilometres of marching as a part of the team, and also have participated in two back-to-back, 40-kilometre team marches. Selection for the final 11 members to participate will be dependent on many factors, including esprit de corps, participation in group marches and the ability to keep and maintain pace. Just because a member completes the anticipated 880 kilometres of marching planned does not guarantee them a spot on the final team. Members will find out in June if they are selected: with three spots held for the team leadership and medic, there are eight positions open. Two additional members will continue training with the team as spares, in case

Wings add story of excellence to uniform

Corporal Jason Ross is “following his path,” which now includes wings.

February 20 at 14 Wing Greenwood, he was presented with his wings, earning the insignia as a newly-trained flight navigator.

“It was always my goal to be a pilot when I joined the air force,” Ross said, but described how, in 2008 at the age of 34, he was told he was “too old” at the Canadian Armed Forces recruiting centre, and it was pointed out he had no post-secondary education. “They signed me up as an aviations systems technician and told me to then become a flight engineer.

“There are 12 more months ahead before I can fly by myself, but I’ll be learning while I’m on the job. Tomorrow, it’s back to 405.”

No one was disputing the time it took to make this a reality for the hundreds of in-residence or visiting military members and other guests that stay in the lodges or barracks at Greenwood.

“The view across the air force is that wifi is a quality of life provision, part of looking after our personnel,” said Adamson. “Now, they have access to what they need, they can check email and surf TV,

ican soldiers opted to stay in local motels over base accommodations because of the lack of wifi service: a move that cost 14 Wing \$28,000. Longer-term accommodations residents have been able to buy their own wifi and cable packages – but that’s been out-of-pocket and not compensable.

Garabed’s initial intent was to have wifi contracted

Unlike your own home, where you could stream and surf whatever you like, people in 14 Wing’s accommodations should have “no expectation of privacy,” Garabed says.

Guests will have to sign an acceptable use policy before being given a password for the wifi service. Terms and conditions are based on the service as a provision of the Government of Canada, “subject to security monitoring,” without notice; for activities including accessing hate literature or pornography, criminal violations, sharing a password, offensive or illegal software or files, use for personal financial gain, hacking, illegal downloading or pirating files.
