Weighty effort restores Bonaventure Memorial

The HMCS Bonaventure aircraft carrier was the pride of the Royal Canadian Navy, serving from January 1957 until July 1970. The "Bonnie," as it was affectionately referred to, was purchased from Great Britain and, at that time, was called the HMS Powerfull, built by Harland and Wolf, Belfast, Northern Ireland; and launched in February 1945. During her active service, the Bonnie carried a crew of 1,300 officers and men and served on a variety of missions with her varied array of rotary- and fixed-wing aircraft.

When the ship was decommissioned in 1970 and

eventually sold for scrap in Taiwan, there was a desire to keep part of the beloved Bonnie in Halifax. The ship's monument, dedicated in 1973 is made up of large anchor and chain, along with a small chain connected to the monument and running directly into the water, making the "connection" of the monument to the sea complete. The original purpose of the monument was to honour aircrew lost at sea, but it would eventually also become a place to honour naval personnel who lost their lives on peacetime duty.

Over the years, the elements have taken their toll. The Bonaventure Monument anchor mounts had failed, rendering the anchor unsecured and the monument unsafe. This would require a multi-phase approach to

make the monument both stable and secure for the many who come to view the site, reflect and read the names engraved on several plaques.

14 Construction Engineering Squadron was tasked with the project, and Exercise Ready Warden was

developed. The work would be carried out by members of both 143 Construction Engineering Flight in Bridgewater and 144 Construction Engineering Flight in Pictou. Captain Lukaszczuk-Therien, 144 CEF flight commander, was tasked with leading the exercise.

The work began with the dismantling of the monument: removal of the unsecured anchor and ship's cable from the anchor mounts that, over time, had failed to properly support the anchor. A new, metal stand was fabricated for the anchor to rest on, along with a hidden con-

crete base under the anchor to provide additional support. Once the new resting place is complete, the anchor and cable will be replaced.

The monument will be back as an amazing symbol in Point Pleasant Park, a focal point at Battle of the Atlantic ceremonies in May.

Busy stretch for Greenwood SAR crews

March 14, just after 10 a.m., a 14 Wing Greenwood Cormorant out of 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron flew to Sydney for a potential medevac from a ship about 90 nautical miles southeast of Sydney.

March 16, just before 1 p.m. a Cormorant helicopter launched in support of a report of a person in the water near Moncton. Local RCMP and fire department assets were also en route. By 1:20 p.m., the Cormorant was stood down and was returning to 14 Wing.

March 17, a Cormorant left in response to a medevac call off the northern coast of New Brunswick, around 10:30 a.m. The helicopter was stood down when the call was turned over to local Coast Guard assets, and returned to Greenwood just after 5 p.m.

March 20, just after noon, Hercules R344 was tasked to assist with a search for a missing snowmobiler between Natuashish and Hopedale, Newfoundland and Labrador. 103 Squadron R901 was called initially; the Greenwood-based aircraft was heading to Goose Bay to assist, but returned to 14 Wing with a service issue to await a second call-out first thing March 21.

Also March 20, just after noon, Cormorant R909 was tasked while airborne to potentially extract an injured person on the shoreline of the Bay of Fundy, north of Greenwood. The provincial Emergency Health Service also tasked a LifeFlight helicopter for extraction. The LifeFlight helicopter was able to make the extraction, with R909 standing by.

Correction

Kenny eyes 14 Wing's ability to force generate

Lieutenant David Coughlin, 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron,

14 Wing Greenwood was honoured to host Brigadier-General Eric Kenny March 14. As deputy commander force generation for 1 Canadian Air Division Headquarters, Kenny is responsible to the commander of 1 CAD for developing and maintaining the readiness of Royal Canadian Air Force operational capabilities. By visiting the 12 wings under the command of 1 CAD, he is able to speak directly to wing and unit command teams, as well as their personnel, to better understand their roles, capacities, challenges and areas where his role and responsibilities can prioritize 1 CAD headquarters' staff efforts.

Kenny appreciated the opportunity to visit several 14 Wing squadrons, covering long range patrol (LRP), search and rescue (SAR) and air traffic control (ATC) capabilities. He gained a much better appreciation of the tremendous work being done at 14 Wing, and was able to experience some good East Coast weather at the same time.

Kenny spent the morning touring through 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) Squadron and 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron, getting to know the members, the various training plans and spending some time in the simulators piloting the

CP140 Aurora. Discussing the abilities and the function of the Aurora gave him a unique understanding of the role it plays within the RCAF. While with 405 Squadron, Kenny took the time to meet with some of the crew members who work on the Aurora, discussing future manning, work being done with 405 Squadron and the future of LRP readiness.

The afternoon was spent with 14 Air Maintenance Squadron, 415 (Long Range Patrol Force Development) Squadron, at the ATC tower and 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron. Kenny was able to discuss how the Auroras are being maintained, as well as the timeline for the next block of Aurora updates and what capabilities crew can look forward to. While meeting with ATC tower personnel in particular, Kenny gained a deeper understanding of the ATC trade and was briefed on the capabilities of the under construction ATC tower.

At 413 Squadron, Kenny met with SAR-Techs to discuss the remarkable role they fulfill, as well as how the trade will be manned and supported. 413 Squadron provided a static display of the C130 Hercules and the CH149 Cormorant to discuss both aircrafts' capabilities.

Kenny enjoyed his visit to 14 Wing and is already looking forward to the next time he can come back to Greenwood.

Ten youth between the ages of 14 and 16 applied and were accepted for a place on the annual Kevin Grant Rural Youth Leadership Tour. Grant worked for many years for the provincial Department of Agriculture, and established the tour to give youth a look at rural development, opportunity and the value of community leadership. The tour rotates around Nova Scotia, this year returning to the Valley region.

“It’s a hard decision on where to take the youth, but one thing that stood out from the last time we were in the Valley was the base,” said Colin Hirtle, the Department of Agriculture’s agricultural leadership coordinator.

The tour included a visit to Michelin in Cambridge, Eden Valley Poultry in Berwick, a sustainable, land-based aquaculture operation in Centre Burlington and Avon Valley’s floral greenhouses in Falmouth. The youth had a semi-formal dinner with business and community leaders.

“We’re looking for places and people who will highlight what skills and characteristics they are looking for as employers, and the different skill sets youth may need for future employment opportunities.”

Museum volunteers Bill Fraser and Sophie Saulnier hosted the 4-H contingent, leading them through a customized version of the established Flight Education program. They talked about the establishment of the wing as a British training base during the Second World War, and its evolution through the next 75 years. The 4-Hers had the chance to walk through many of the museum’s exhibits, including the Anson and Argus displays, and had a sneak peak in the museum’s workshop, where volunteers have spent hours, weeks and years restoring aircraft history for future display.

Master Warrant Officer Keith Mitchell came in to talk about the base’s search and rescue responsibilities, and Captain John Pulchny shared what happens at 14 Wing day-to-day, including its people and squadrons, roles and missions and impact as an employer in the Valley.

Allies working, learning, anti-sub warfare

NATO's submarine warfare exercise, Dynamic Manta 2018, occurred March 2 to 16 off the Sicilian coast of Italy. Dynamic Manta remains one of the most challenging exercises for NATO and offers NATO nations an excellent opportunity to practice together in a pure joint environment, while simultaneously providing NATO the ability to evaluate and further develop Allied anti-submarine tactics.

This year, submarines from Canada, Greece, Italy, Spain, Turkey and the United States, under the control of NATO Submarine Command; joined nine surface ships from Belgium, France, Greece, Italy, Spain, Turkey, the United Kingdom and the United States. In total, 10 Allied nations combined their ships, submarines, aircraft and crews for anti-submarine warfare and anti-surface warfare training on, under and over the Central Mediterranean Sea. Support was provided from the Augusta Naval Base, Catania Harbour and the Sigonella Air Base in Catania, on the island of Sicily. Ten maritime patrol aircraft and eight helicopters from Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Spain, Turkey, United Kingdom and the United States operated from Sigonella Air Base, under the control of personnel from NATO Maritime Air Command.

Canada's CP140 Aurora participation includes crews from 404, 407 and 405 squadrons, with 14 Wing Greenwood providing two aircraft. The 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) Squadron crew comprised not only 404 staff but also acoustic sensor operators and pilot students. This is not the first time MOAT (Maritime Operational Aircrew Training) students have been employed and trained in an operational or highly demanding training environment; on a previous MOAT, all students on one crew conducted an Operation Limpid (N) event, conducting missions over Northern Canada in support of Joint Task Force North's mandate to conduct surveillance over the region in their area of responsibility. Both of these operations and exercises have proven to be extremely valuable training opportunities for MOAT crews, tailored for the types each of missions. 404 Squadron and the CP140 fleet will continue to seek these kinds of ideal training opportunities in order to



enhance the skill and experience level of MOAT graduates.

The next exercise with similar participation will be in June of this year when 14 Wing will once again send two aircraft and the CP140 fleet will send a crew from 404, 405 and 407 squadrons to Joint Warrior 18, being conducted out of Andoya Air Base in Norway.
