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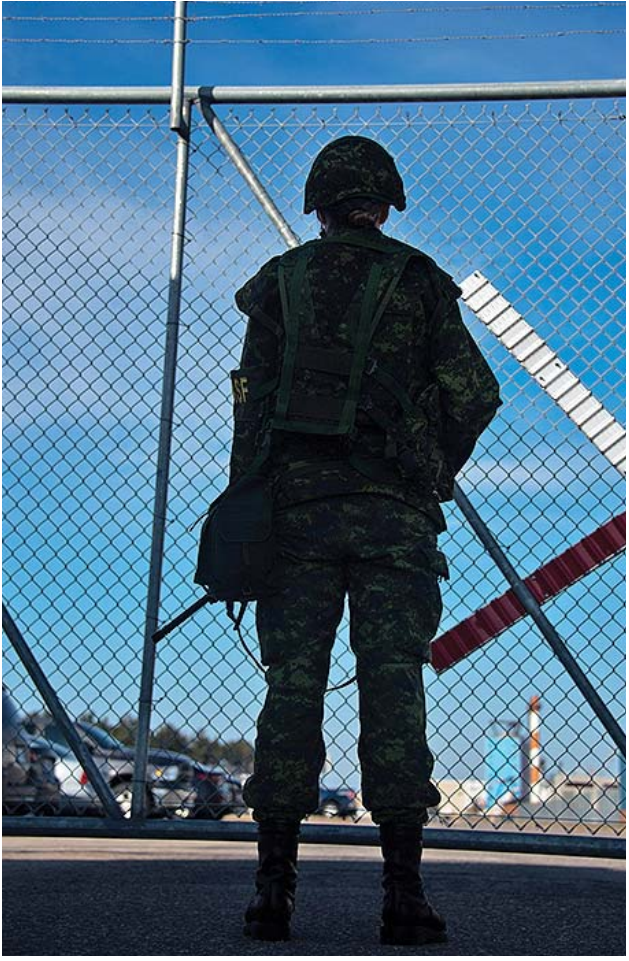

Security call | Wing team ready to respond

Every active member of 14 Wing Greenwood's Wing Auxiliary Security Force (WASF) team is tied to their duty cell phone, despite their day-to-day work. When called upon, team members move into action so wider base operations and personnel may continue to function under the safe and secure umbrella WASF provides.

Unlike most security forces, whose duties are limited to a singular tasking; 14 Wing's WASF may be tasked anywhere that falls under 14 Wing's area of responsibility.

Once deployed, they come directly under the Military Police chain of command, providing them with specific direction and authority to carry out the mandate at hand.

In a heightened readiness posture, you may find WASF members at the base gates, providing added staffing and armament to more routine, daily security forces. They could conduct a search of a vehicle or individual, if either falls under suspicion due to

their actions or whereabouts. In times of an emergency, including securing a crash site of an aircraft or other asset belonging to the Royal Canadian Air Force, WASF members will be found.

Nous avons lu à ce sujet, et nous l'avons vu à la télévision et sur les médias sociaux : les crises cardiaques, les AVC et les cancers sont les trois affections qui touchent le plus de Canadiens. Ces derniers sont de plus en plus susceptibles de tomber gravement malades au cours de leur vie, selon les statistiques. 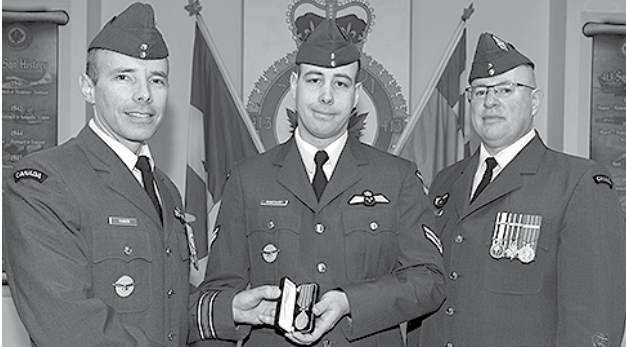

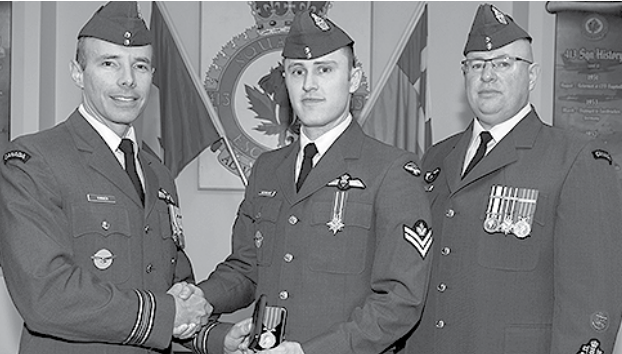

Museum Flight Ed marks 8,000th student visitor

Evangeline Middle School students visited the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum February 28, taking in the Grade 6 Flight Education program.

Fifty-nine Grade 6 students, teachers and escorts participated; student Morgan van der Hoogen was identified as the 8,000th participant in this program since it started 16 years ago.

To commemorate this

milestone, GMAM Society president, Brigadier-General (retired) Perry Matte presented teacher Kathy Badcooke with a book for the school library, written by Colonel (retired) Herb Smale, entitled “RCAF Avro Lancaster KB839.” The book is an historical narrative about this distinctive Lancaster aircraft, on display in the GMAM air park in its refurbished Second World War configuration. The book will help students relate to the historical significance of this unique museum display.

In his presentation to the students, Matte highlighted

the importance of the Flight Ed program to their lessons about flight, and was particularly pleased with the close cooperation between Valley schools and the museum. He pointed out the students’ participation helps them learn about over 75 years of aviation history, changing technology and significant events related to the Greenwood base; and that their understanding of the many technological changes in aviation could help them make their own career choices in the future. He wished them well as they continue with their education.

Museum general manager Major Allan Baillie also acknowledged this milestone, presenting van der Hoogen with a GMAM T-shirt and congratulating him on being the 8,000th participant in the GMAM Flight Ed program.

As the wife of a bandmaster, it is an understatement to say my sons and I have attended a few of the 14 Wing Greenwood Bands' concerts; in fact, in the time we've been living in Greenwood, the boys and I have attended ALL of 14 Wing's local concerts!

The 14 Wing Band performs a number of concerts throughout the year, commemorating military history, such as the Battle of Britain; celebrating milestones and events, such as the band's 2017 75th anniversary, Canada 150; and Christmas. Last year, in cooperation with the Greenwood Military Family Resource Centre, the band introduced something new: a celebration of the Month of the Military Child in April, with a child-focused concert event. Warrant

Officer Jeff Campbell hoped to celebrate the resilience of military children, and also share his love of music with our community's children, by selecting a concert program to appeal to younger audiences. (As a parent himself, he knows how children get fidgety, need a shorter program and lots of visual stimulus.)

This year's Month of the Military Child Concert April 15 was an amazing musical experience! The band performed a number of hit songs from movies, including "The Incredibles," "Despicable Me," "Star Wars" and "Pirates of the Caribbean;" accompanied at times by the theatrics of costumed actors from the Greenwood Players. Children witnessed light sabre duels, pirates fleeing from their pursuers and even got the chance to nibble pirate gold!

The concert was also supported by the local Ukulele Ladies, a quartet of talented singers who engaged the audience with a number of children's songs - even involving the children in a "mad lib" and having them choose the words to one of their songs.

Special guest Petty Officer Second Class Raef Wilson from the Stadacona Band of the Royal Canadian Navy really made the concert entertaining. Wilson has a gift for musical comedy and has been a hit performer at the Stad Band's school concerts for many years. He knows how make both children and adults laugh, appearing in ridiculous costumes for his performances, using funny accents, singing silly songs and putting his heart and soul into performances. At this concert, he dressed up as a

janitor and joined the band on what he called a "de-sumpa-pumpa-phonium" - or, a garden hose with a funnel at the end. He surprised everyone with his ability to play the trumpet part for the piece the band was performing! From there, Wilson's antics had him disguised as an eye doctor, a hockey player and a boxer. I enjoyed watching many young parents in the audience singing along with his quirky version of "Bananaphone." Wilson's performance will be one of his last as a member of the Canadian Armed Forces, as he retires this summer after 42 years of service.

The MFRC provided children with Silly Putty to play with while they waited, mats on the floor to sit on - close to the performers and, while the concert offered a lot of punch, it was the perfect length. One favourite part was the eruption of a mini mosh pit on the mats during the final March Past! It was adorable to see the young audience members jumping up and down, and really getting into the spirit of the music.

For those of you who didn't make it to this year's Month of the Military Child Concert, look for this event next year. It is a great way to celebrate our children and enjoy a fun hour of musical entertainment.

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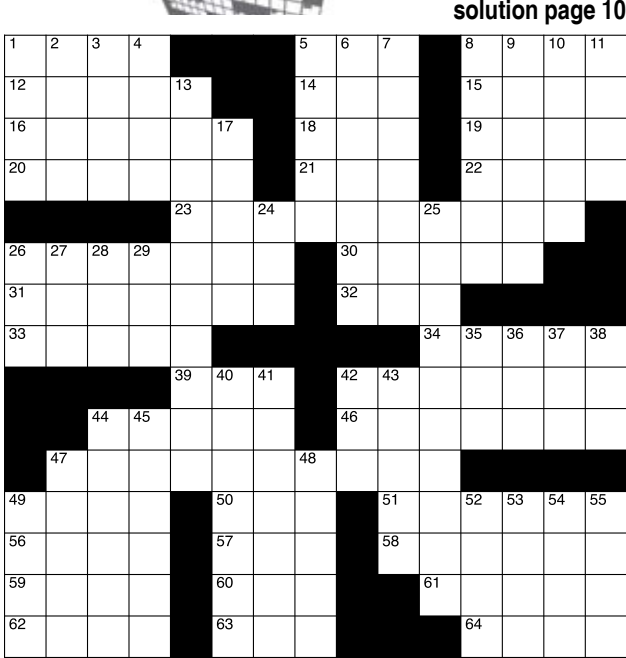

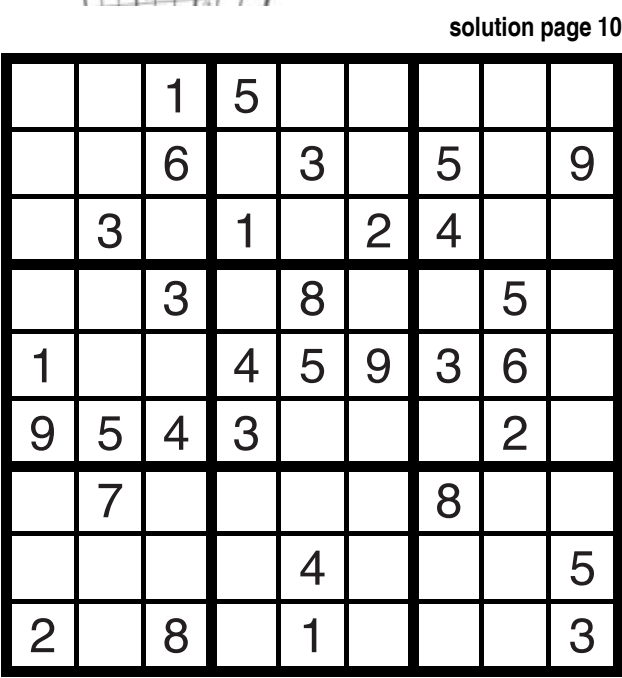

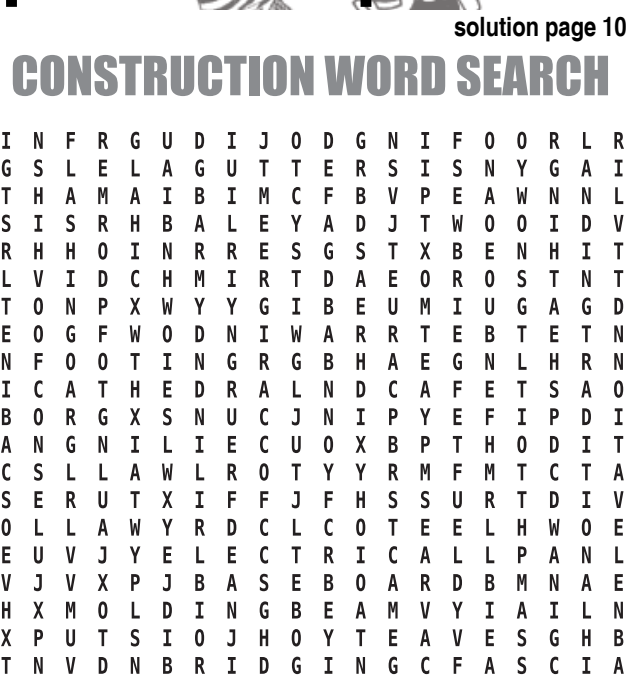

Captain Stephanie Dennis (nee Bigelow) a Comox, British Columbia, native and second-year Dalhousie medical student, has been recognized as an Academic All Canadian by U Sports, the leader of university sports in Canada.

An Academic All Canadian is one of the highest honours a student athlete can achieve. To qualify, student athletes must maintain an academic standing of 80 per cent or better while playing on a university varsity team. A former Canadian junior national team member, Dennis swims with the Dalhousie swim team.

She began her military career 13 years ago as an officer and, in addition to her service to her country, she has volunteered for a wide variety of initiatives, including the Canadian Armed Forces' speakers bureau, a national outreach program that provides speakers to schools, conferences and organizations across the country.

Dennis received her bachelor's degree in chemistry at the Royal Military College of Canada in Kingston, Ontario. After graduation, she earned her wings as an Royal Canadian Air Force navigator

and became the first female instructor to train navigators at 1 Canadian Forces Flying Training School at Canadian Forces Base Winnipeg. After three years of instructing, in 2013, Dennis was posted to

14 Wing Greenwood, where she was the first person to successfully become a tactical navigator immediately out of flight school on the CP140 Aurora, a long-range patrol aircraft. During her time on the Aurora, Dennis chased drug smugglers over the Caribbean and hunted submarines throughout the Atlantic Ocean - all while pregnant with her first child.

A passion for the benefits of a healthy lifestyle led Dennis to apply to the Canadian Armed Forces' Medical Officer Training Program in 2015. She was accepted to the program and Dalhousie's Faculty of Medicine in 2016. It also meant Dennis had an opportunity to be an active member of the Dalhousie swim team.

"I've had such a great experience working with the coaches," says Dennis, "and I am so inspired by the men and women on the team. They are such dedicated,

smart individuals. They are balancing so much between their studies, community work and being on a varsity team. I have so much respect for them."

Canadian Armed Forces, Dennis also has a two-year-old son, Eric, and 10-month-old daughter, Freya. In fact, she was pregnant with Freya in the first year of medical school and brought her to the All Canadian Awards luncheon, holding her in her arms as she accepted her award.

"I showed up with my daughter. She had been with me in my belly the whole time I was swimming for the swim team, so she deserved the award as well!"

Dennis would like to work in the area of family medicine and, in her final year of medical school, would like to complete her student research project on the benefits of exercise and pregnancy.

"I am always surprised at what you can do if you put your mind to something. I am a big believer in taking an opportunity if it is presented to you."
