egacy Aurora on long haul home

Aurora aircraft CP140102 departed 14 Wing Greenwood August 31: well, most of her did.

Four tractor trailer trucks pulling flatbeds carried the aircraft fuselage, both the left and right wings and the aircraft's tail; in a convoy across the base and through the village of Greenwood, the beginning of a 1,500-kilometre journey to the National Air Force Museum of Canada in Trenton, Ontario.

The transport of CP140102 by road, over such a great distance, represents a first for 14 Wing's 14 Air Maintenance Squadron, according to Lieutenant Allison Bergenhus, a squadron aerospace engineering officer. Ideally, an aircraft would be flown to its final resting place, and then decommissioned; however, Aurora CP140102 was officially withdrawn from use in the Royal Canadian Air Force's fleet of CP140s in 2015.

equipment slowed the project until the spring of 2018.

Then, the late summer move deadline must have seem overly ambitious for the planning team, which included Bergenhus, Sergeant Tyler Feindel and Master Corporal Benjamin Spring of 14 AMS; as well as a group of technicians from IMP Aerospace, under the direction of Captain Colin Harrison, CP140 Deputy Aircraft Engineering Officer, in Ottawa.

The team employed equipment used on ASLEP (the Aurora Service Life Extension Project) to stabilize the aircraft, then take it apart at the same joints it was assembled with back in the late 1970s. The fuselage posed the greatest challenge to lift and move, as no comparable work like this had been done by IMP. Special equipment to lift and ship the fuselage was borrowed from the United States Navy, and worked flawlessly on the lift and subsequent move to Trenton.

Prior to the final road trip, Aurora CP140102 had a remarkable 35-year military career. She accumulated 24,488.5
