## MADD Bay of Fundy launches annual Red Ribbon campaign tackling impaired driving

Krista Toole's day started out as a typical Saturday October 27, 2017: sunny, fall colours outside and laundry and housework inside. After lunch, it became "the worst day.'

He father, Morris Longmire, and his twin brother, Paul, were out for a drive along the Shore Road in Parker's Cove when a drunk driver in an incoming truck struck and killed them both.

"And that very instant, our family dynamic changed. Dad and Paul's lives were so inter-

twined: they worked hard, they were slow to anger, they often travelled together, dressed similarly and finished each other's sentences. Dad was my 'go-to' guy: he knew something about everything, and I no longer have him to call."

The families went to all the court proceedings over the next months: the drunk driver was well over twice the legal limit. The original charges of two counts of impaired driving causing death and two counts of criminal negligence causing death were replaced in the end with a charge of dangerous operation of a vehicle causing death, and the man was sen-





### The 12 Days of Holiday Fire Safety - Key Messages


- Day 1 Water fresh trees daily. It's time to trim that Christmas tree, and if you're using a real tree, buy a fresh tree and keep the base of the trunk in water at all times. Keep your tree away from any ignition source such as the fireplace, heaters or candles.
- Day 2 *Check all sets lights before decorating.* Before you put up those lights on the tree or around the front window check the cords closely. Discard any sets that are frayed or damaged.
- Day 3 Make sure you have working smoke alarms. With family and friends spending extra time at your home over the holidays, it's a great time to check your smoke alarms. Remember that you need working smoke alarms on every storey of your home and outside all sleeping areas. Test your alarms to make sure they will alert you and your family if a fire occurs, giving you the precious seconds you need to safely escape. Replace smoke alarms if they are over 10 years old.
- Day 4 *Make sure you have working carbon monoxide alarms*. Carbon monoxide is an invisible, odourless gas that can quickly kill you. Installing carbon monoxide alarms in your home will alert you to the presence of this deadly gas. Replace any carbon monoxide alarms over seven years old.
- Day 5 Make sure everyone knows how to get out safely if a fire occurs. Develop and practice a home escape plan with all members of the household and make sure someone helps young children, older adults or anyone else that may need assistance to evacuate. Once outside, stay outside and call 911 from a cell phone or neighbour's house.
- Day 6 *Use extension cords wisely*. People often use extension cords for that extra set of lights or the dancing Santa in the corner. Extension cords should be used only as a temporary connection. Make sure cords never go under rugs as this can cause damage to the cord and cause a fire.
- Day 7 Give space heaters space. If you are using space heaters to help take the chill off, remember to keep them at least one metre (3 feet) away from anything that can burn such as curtains, upholstery, or
- Day 8 When you go out, blow out! Candles can set the perfect mood for a holiday celebration, but remember to always blow out candles before leaving the room or going to bed. Keep lit candles safely away from children and pets and anything that can burn, such as curtains, upholstery, or holiday decorations.
- Day 9 Keep matches and lighters out of the sight and reach of children. People often keep matches and lighters handy to light holiday candles. But matches and lighters can be deadly in the hands of children. If you smoke, have only one lighter or book of matches and keep them with you at all times.
- Day 10 Watch what you heat! The holiday season is one of the busiest times of the year, which means it's easy to get distracted from what we are doing. Cooking fires most commonly occur when cooking is left unattended. Always stay in the kitchen when cooking - especially if using oil or high temperatures. If a pot catches fire, carefully slide a tight-fitting lid over the pot to smother the flames and then turn
- Day 11 *Encourage smokers to smoke outside*. Careless smoking is the leading cause of fatal fires. If you do allow smoking indoors use large, deep ashtrays that can't be knocked over and make sure cigarette butts are properly extinguished.
- Day 12 *There's more to responsible drinking than taking a cab home.* With all the festive cheer this time of year, keep a close eye on anyone attempting to cook or smoke while under the influence of alcohol. Alcohol is all too often a common factor in many fatal fires.

### Les 12 jours de la sécurité incendie pendant le temps des fêtes - Messages importants

- Jour 1 Vérifiez l'eau du sapin tous les jours. Il est temps de décorer le sapin de Noël et, si vous utilisez un vrai arbre fraîchement coupé, maintenez la base du tronc dans l'eau en tout temps. Éloignez le sapin des sources potentielles d'incendie, telles que les foyers, les appareils de chauffage et les bougies.
- Jour 2 Vérifiez toutes les guirlandes lumineuses avant de les utiliser. Avant de placer les guirlandes lumineuses sur le sapin ou autour de la fenêtre avant, vérifiez les cordons électriques attentivement. Mettez au rebut les guirlandes endommagées ou dont le cordon semble usé.
- Jour 3 Vérifiez le bon fonctionnement des détecteurs de fumée. Avec la famille et les amis qui passent du temps chez vous pendant les fêtes, c'est le moment de vérifier vos détecteurs de fumée. N'oubliez pas que vous devez avoir des détecteurs de fumée en état de fonctionnement à chaque étage de votre habitation et à l'extérieur de toutes les pièces où vous dormez. Vérifiez que vos détecteurs fonctionnent pour vous alerter, vous et votre famille, en cas d'incendie et vous laisser les quelques précieuses secondes nécessaires pour évacuer les lieux en toute sécurité. Remplacez les détecteurs de fumée s'ils ont plus de dix ans.
- Jour 4 Vérifiez le bon fonctionnement des détecteurs de monoxyde de carbone. Le monoxyde de carbone est un gaz invisible, sans odeur, qui peut vous tuer rapidement. En installant des détecteurs de monoxyde de carbone à la maison, vous serez avertis en cas de présence de ce gaz mortel. Remplacez les détecteurs de monoxyde de carbone de plus de sept ans.
- Jour 5 Assurez-vous que chacun sait comment sortir en toute sécurité en cas d'incendie. Mettez au point un plan d'évacuation de la maison et essayez-le avec tous les membres du ménage, en vous assurant que quelqu'un aide les jeunes enfants, les adultes plus âgés ou quiconque pourrait avoir besoin d'aide pour sortir. Une fois à l'extérieur, restez dehors et appelez le 911 depuis un téléphone cellulaire ou le téléphone d'un voisin.
- Jour 6 Utilisez les rallonges électriques avec précaution. Les gens utilisent fréquemment des rallonges pour raccorder des guirlandes lumineuses supplémentaires ou un père Noël qui danse dans un coin. Les rallonges électriques doivent être utilisées pour des raccordements provisoires uniquement. Veillez à ne jamais les passer sous un tapis, sous peine de les endommager et d'entraîner un incendie.
- Jour 7 Faites de la place aux radiateurs électriques portatifs. Si vous utilisez des radiateurs électriques portatifs pour réchauffer une pièce, souvenez-vous de les placer au moins à un mètre (3 pieds) de tout élément susceptible de brûler (rideaux, ameublement, décorations des fêtes, etc.).
- Jour 8 En sortant, éteignez les bougies! Les bougies installent une ambiance parfaite pour les fêtes, mais n'oubliez pas de toujours les éteindre avant de quitter la pièce ou d'aller vous coucher. Éloignez les bougies allumées de la portée des enfants et des animaux, mais aussi de tout ce qui pourrait brûler (rideaux, ameublement, décorations des fêtes, etc.).
- Jour 9 Éloignez les allumettes et les briquets de la vue et de la portée des enfants. Les gens gardent souvent les allumettes et les briquets à portée de main pour allumer les bougies des fêtes. Mais entre les mains des enfants, les allumettes et les briquets peuvent se révéler extrêmement dangereux. Si vous fumez, contentezvous d'un seul briquet ou d'une seule boîte d'allumettes, que vous garderez sur vous en permanence.
- Jour 10 Surveillez les fourneaux! Il est facile de se laisser distraire pendant la saison des fêtes qui compte parmi les périodes les plus occupées de l'année. Le plus souvent, les feux de cuisson se produisent par manque de surveillance. Restez toujours dans la cuisine lorsque vous cuisez des plats, surtout si vous utilisez de l'huile ou si vous cuisinez à des températures élevées. Si le feu prend dans une casserole, faites glisser doucement un couvercle hermétique dessus pour étouffer les flammes, puis éteignez la source de chaleur.
- Jour 11 Invitez les fumeurs à fumer à l'extérieur. La négligence des fumeurs est la principale cause des incendies mortels. Si vous autorisez les fumeurs à fumer à l'intérieur de la maison, prévoyez des cendriers profonds qui ne peuvent pas se renverser et assurez-vous que les mégots de cigarettes sont correctement éteints.
- Jour 12 La consommation d'alcool responsable ne s'arrête pas à prendre un taxi pour rentrer à la maison. Avec toutes les occasions de trinquer qui se présentent à cette période de l'année, surveillez bien les personnes qui tentent de cuisiner ou de fumer sous l'influence de l'alcool. L'alcool est bien trop souvent un dénominateur commun dans nombre d'incendies mortels.




